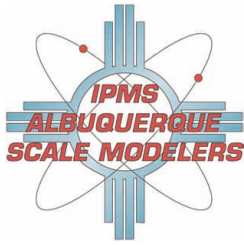

### May Contest Results: "World War I"

The May meeting was a busy night with two great contests. The World War I theme (points) contest had 27 entries, with 12 models relating to WWI—much higher than seen in previous WWI contests. The Micro-Modeling Sponsored Contest hosted by the E-Board had 25 entries—I didn't know there were that many small-scale builders out there! Additionally, we had 10 works in progress on display. Pictures of the best of show winners are in the Newsletter; all pictures and detailed contest results can be found on the ASM website.

In the Juniors division, Hamish Connell won the Best of Show and People's Choice Awards, and a Gold ribbon in Dioramas & Vignettes for his excellent "First Round of the Day" diorama featuring a British 18-Pounder field gun and crew. Jeannie Garriss won a Gold ribbon in the Automotive category with her nicely-finished Jeff Gordon "Pepsi" Monte Carlo. Bre Anna Camacho won a Silver ribbon in Aircraft with her Boiled Egg Blue Jumbo 747 Dash 400. Nice work, Juniors!

Don't forget the Swap meet at Hobbies 'N Stuff on June 4 behind the shop—there are usually a lot of good bargains to be had!

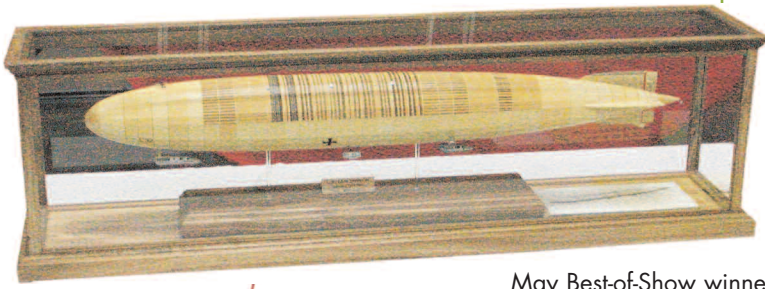
ASM will have our second swap meet at the July 8 meeting, so start saving those pennies!

to John Kendrick for his excellent "Mk A 'Whippet'" tank. Don Smith had a bunch of excellent models entered, winning a Gold and Silver ribbon in Dioramas & Vignettes with his "Raptors" (two nicely-finished dinosaurs, not F/A-22s); and his "On to Hill 227" featuring two very, very, very tiny Sherman tanks in 1/700 scale. Don also won a Silver ribbon in Figures for his World War I German pilot.

In the Intermediate division, David Downs won both the Best of Show and People's Choice awards, and a First in Armor & Military with his excellently finished and weathered Ford Model T Ambulance in 1/72 scale. Second place in Armor & Military went to Tom Redling's British AS-90 155 mm Self-Propelled Gun. Rick Carver had a group of nicely done models, taking a First and Second in Science Fiction & Fantasy with his Sulaco spaceship and Dropship from the "Aliens" movie. Rick also won a First in Figures with his "N/A" (you'll have to check out the website to see what this was). Brian Willard swept the Aircraft category with his nicely built A-7 Corsair II (First place), F-15C Eagle (Second) and Su-27 Flanker (Third).

The Masters division had their best showing of the year with 14 excellent entries. The Best of Show in Masters was won by Dave Straub's superb Zeppelin L32 airship, which also took First in the Aircraft category. The People's Choice—Master award was won by Ken Piniak's excellent FT-17 Tank in 1/72 scale. In the Dioramas & Vignettes category, First place went to Stan Harris' excellent "Trench Warfare—1917." Jim Guld took Second and Third places respectively with his excellent "The Long Road Home" and "Operation Black." In the Armor & Military category, First place went to Jim Guld's excellent VC Firefly, 3rd Troop, 1st Northant's Yeomanry, 1944. John Tate took Second and Third places respectively with

his excellent Mark IV (Female) Tank, Cambrai 1917, and German WWI

7.7cm Field Gun. In the Aircraft category, Dave Straub took First with his Zeppelin L32 airship. Second place went to Patrick Dick's Fokker D-VII in 1/48 scale. Third place was won by Mike Blohm's Nieuport 28 in 1/72 scale. Don MacBryde also had an excellent Fokker D-VII entered. In the Figures category, Stan Harris took First place with his awesome mounted "Scots Grey—1815." John Tate took Second with his nicely-done "Teufel Krieg"—WWI German Stormtroop.

### Micro-Modeling Contest Results

The Best Overall Entry award was won by Dave Straub's Zeppelin L32 airship. With 25 total entries in multiple categories, it was tough to break down the lower level awards.

The E-Board's decision on the breakdown, and the winners, are as follows: The Best Aircraft award went to John Tate's Su-25 Frogfoot. The Best Military Award went to Dave Miller's 105mm Leichte Feldhaubitze 18/40 artillery piece. The Best "All Others" Award went to John Tate's "Kursk" submarine.

The E-board greatly appreciates the excellent turnout. Awards will be presented at the June meeting.

## JIM'S SPRUES & REVIEWS

### On the Bookshelf

I figured I would do something different this month. After looking over the living room bookshelves, more of which I now have to build to fit all the armor reference books, I decided to list some of my favorites and give a brief description of each. Now I'm not saying you have to go out and buy all of these, I just thought I would list some of my favorites.

“Sherman Firefly” by Mark Hayward. This book is the bible on the Firefly. It has tons of excellent wartime and

preserved Firefly pictures. It also has 1/35 scale drawings of the different Firefly models and lists the different kits out there.

“The British Soldier Vols. 1 – 2” by Jean Bouchery. These books cover just about everything you will need to know about the Brits from D-Day to VE-Day.

“Terrain Modeling” by Richard Windrow. Not a bad book but I was hoping for more. It does cover a number of different techniques such as water, rocks, and general landscaping.

“The WWII GI in Color Photographs” by Windrow & Hawkins. Excellent book with all the different uniforms worn in WWII and pictures of weapons and even a Sherman M4A1 thrown in for good measure.

Concord Series of books. Not very big usually under 100 pages but useful for diorama ideas and usually have a number of good pictures of buildings and geographic locations.

After The Battle Magazine. Of the few I have they are great for particular battles and usually have nice detailed maps and units involved in the battles.

“Model Fan Encyclopedia #6 T-34 in Combat Vol. 2.” This was a fairly inexpensive book, under \$20, and in this volume it covers the T-34 up to the 1943 versions.

“Panzerwrecks Vol. 1” by Lee Archer & Bill Auerbach. The title says it all. Great pictures of destroyed German Armor on the Western Front 1944 – 45.

Jentz & Doyle Series of books on German Armor. Pretty much can’t go wrong here. These guys don’t re-

lease books until all the i’s are dotted and t’s crossed. They also do the Panzer Tracts series of books on different German Armor.

Spielberger Series of books on different German Armor. Before Jentz & Doyle he was the Mack Daddy of German Armor. Still these books stand up.

Model Graphix series of books on German Armor. Good for getting the details in the right places but it is a good idea to double-check some of their pictures against the Jentz & Doyle books. They even show how some of the different onboard tools were used, like the track changing tools.

AFV Modeller. This is my favorite model magazine. It has great photography and layout, done as well as any art magazine I’ve ever seen. They usually have a section on extreme details that has walk around photos of a particular vehicle. They also do articles about different weathering techniques. I’ve picked up a number of my techniques from this magazine. The only downside is that it is slow in getting to my house.

So that about does it for this month. Now back to model building. I’m trying to keep up with Obi-Wan Tate.
